
National Black HIV/AIDS **Awareness Day**

February 7

National Black HIV/AIDS Awareness Day is observed each year to raise awareness of HIV within Black communities and show support for people living with HIV in these communities.

In 2020, **12,557** Black people were diagnosed with HIV in the United States.

Only 14% of the U.S. population is Black, but **43%** of new HIV diagnoses are Black.



Black gay and bisexual men are more affected by HIV than any other group. In 2020, 27% of new HIV diagnoses were Black gay and bisexual men.



Between 2016-2020, the number of new HIV diagnoses among Black women in the U.S. decreased each year.



of Black people living with HIV in the U.S. were **virally** suppressed in 2019.

Viral suppression is when a person has very low levels of HIV in their blood. People who are virally suppressed cannot pass HIV on to sex partners.

How you can prevent HIV transmission



If you are living with HIV, take your medications as prescribed to stay healthy and greatly reduce the risk of passing HIV to a sex partner.



If you are HIV-negative, ask your doctor about pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP), a daily pill to prevent HIV.



Regardless of your status, use a condom when you have sex. Condoms reduce the risk of getting HIV and other sexually transmitted infections.

1 in new HIV diagnoses among Black people in Louisiana were Black women.




Black people are affected by HIV more than other groups.

Only 32% of Louisiana's population is Black but 70% of new HIV diagnoses in 2020 were Black.
